Rome Federated Garden Center Updates

Construction is completed on the long awaited accessibility ramp for The Garden Center of The Rome Federated Garden Clubs. A new side door entrance with a ramp has been constructed to provide easier access to our older members from the parking area. During the renovations, the bathroom fixtures were updated with a highrise toilet, sink, faucets, and cabinet. The old back door has been enclosed and new siding placed over the former entrance. All locks have been replaced and new keys given to the garden clubs

The landscaping is being revamped as the New Rome Federation Project. Invasive plants, like nandina, English ivy, and mahonia have been removed already. Plans are being made to replace these with Native plants. All of the garden clubs will be working on this project for the next two years.

BLUE STAR MARKERS

The Rome Federated Garden Clubs, Inc. strongly supports the **Blue Star Program** with markers and with **flowers planted** around them, as follows:

The Federated Garden Clubs, Inc. located at the Garden Center at 100 E. 8th Street Sponsored by Seven Hills Garden Club.

Camellia Garden Club located at the exit of Heritage Park on Second Avenue. Lavender View Garden Club located at the intersection of Garden Lakes Blvd and Shoreline Drive.

Mountain View Garden Club located at Myrtle Hill Cemetery in Rome. Seven Hills Garden Club located at Sara Hightower Regional Library,

Spade and Trowel Garden Club located at the intersection of Second Avenue and Turner McCall Boulevard.

Thistle Garden Club located at Rotary Park, 1st Ave. and 6th Ave.

Three Rivers Garden Club located on Jackson Hill at the Rome Visitors Center. Townview Garden Club located at the corner of Broad Street and 5th Ave.. Rome Federation of Garden Clubs Rome, GA sponsored at Government Plaza, Floyd Co Courthouse.

BEAUTIFICATION – GARDENING

Each Club in the Federation has a Civic Improvement project which is a **garden** somewhere in our town that is planted seasonally, maintained and beautifies our town.

The Clock Tower **Federated Garden Project** was completed and dedicated in 2019 and each club has taken a workday as assigned by the project manager to maintain it. Many **monarchs** visited the garden this year. This garden is now **a Rosalynn Carter Butterfly Trail** with a Marker placed there.

This years **Federated Garden Project** was to renovate the landscaping around the Garden Center and the project was headed by Camellia Garden Club. Old plants were removed, and native plants were placed there.

Plants and/or arrangements are placed in the Library by the clubs of the Federation. Clubs take two-week turns and identify the plant by name as a donation by The Rome Federated Garden Clubs.

Arbor Day was celebrated on February 21. The DAR, Rome Federated Garden Clubs, and City of Rome, Rotarians, Nature Conservancy, and Master Gardeners participate annually. Thirteen Willow Oak trees were planted. Rome is a Tree City and received their 30th flag. Rome is one of 9 cities in Georgia to receive the award.

Members **planted shrubs and flowers** at their respective subdivision entrances.

One Club "**Planted in Pink**" at the Tony E. Warren Cancer Center where they maintain a garden at the entrance to the center and always include pink flowers. The Center has a Women's Breast Center.

Patriotic themed wreath was placed at Blue Star Marker, Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day and Patriot's Day, Veterans Day by Three Rivers Garden Club.

RFGC held a **DAYLILY SALE** at the home of President Carrie Wilder as a fundraiser to help make needed renovation to the Garden Center.

THISTLE collected all the items needed for a Habitat for Humanity dedication.

EDUCATION

NGC's LANDSCAPE DESIGN SCHOOL, Course III was held February 12-13 with 29 in attendance.

Educational Programs at our individual club meetings, include programs on hydrangea care, iris care, Lenten rose, and many other plants; presentation by City Arborist; growing herbs and cooking with them; visits to Demonstration Garden at Chieftain Museum, floral design; making bonsai demonstration, pruning program by County Agent; beekeeping, and others.

Allison Waters, Rome Floyd Blight/Litter Task Force presented a program to the Federation in March.

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NGC WEEK

National Garden Week was celebrated by erecting banners on Broad Street at Townview's Garden and at the Clock Tower Garden. Individual Clubs planted, weeded, and spruced up their respective gardens around town.

FIG LEAF PROJECT- COMMUNITY SERVICE

Our county has a **foster care crisis**. This is a **community project** since we no longer have the state mental facility to share stockings and eggs with, we now support the Department of Family and Children Services by collecting needed clothing items for children that have just been picked up and have no possessions with them. We do this in November so some items can be used for Christmas for the children.

Townview Garden Club met with residents of an assisted living center in February to make floral arrangements and valentines with them.

During **2020 Renovations** were made to the **Garden Center** with an accessibility ramp added, new side door entrance for the ramp, bathroom fixtures updated. Locks were replaced and new landscaping.

We socially distanced at the City Labyrinth in September, with Lisa Smith, Georgia's Rome Office of Tourism, as speaker. Our October meeting was a workday at our Library Garden and the Clock Tower Garden. Through the summer and early fall, both of these gardens were weeded, mulched and planted with pansies for winter color. Pine straw was installed as well at each garden. A divide and share of Clock Tower flowers was held for Federation members in October. Our 2021 meetings will include a visit to the Marshal Forrest, a treasure for the Rome urban community. In 2021, Seven Hills will continue to adapt to make meetings happen while improving our City of Rome.



Marshall Forest

Marshall Forest has been the scene of much activity this fall. Many community groups have worked together to help make improvements in the forest.

 \cdot A crew from Roosterhead Warehouse removed part of the existing fence to make way for access to a bus turnaround.

• Andrew Saville, the son of a Garden Club Member, mowed the Pecan Field in preparation for the driveway.

• The City of Rome Public Works Department constructed the culvert and driveway across from the entrance to Marshall Forest, which will provide better access to the pecan grove and river front parts of the forest.

• Berry College Freshmen worked in the forest to remove invasive species on the annual freshman workday.

• The annual Robert Week Memorial Walk, October 16, 2020, was sponsored by Keep Rome Floyd Beautiful in conjunction with the Young Professionals of the Rome Floyd Chamber of Commerce, The Nature Conservancy, The Garden Club of Georgia, and The Weed Family. Over 60 forest enthusiasts turned out for the walk along the Big Pine Braille Trail led by Owen Kinney, Science Teacher at Darlington School, on the gorgeous fall day.

• News coverage of the walk and the Boy Scout Project was provided by the *Rome News Tribune* with two separate articles.

• Marshall Forest was one of the featured destinations on the Georgia Historic Preservation Ramble on October 17, 2020.

• On Saturday October 17, 2020, Philip Lataif along with members of Boy Scout Troop 113 worked to replace the rotted guide rope posts along the trail. The supplies were provided from contributions made to The Land Trust Marshall Forest by Garden Clubs and individuals across the state.

Marshall Forest still has many things that need to be done to keep the trail well maintained and accessible to the physically impaired.

- Finish replacing the remaining guide rope posts.
- Reinstalling the guide ropes with climbing rope donated by a climbing gym in Marietta.

• Installation of crusher run gravel along the Braille Trail to provide more accessibility to the physically impaired.

• Creation of QR codes to provide trail maps, Forest information, and plant identification photos.

The Nature Conservancy is working on a partnership with Berry College and Shorter University to create learning centers in the Pecan field and over to the Coosa River. The goal is make the Marshall Forest a destination for student field trips.
