As we schedule our meetings, work and most importantly our gardens it is helpful to consider where our garden clubs began. Many of us are aware as reported by The National Garden Clubs, the first garden club meeting in the United States took place in Athens, Georgia in 1891. It occurred during a time when women were seeking knowledge about a variety of subjects in study clubs of those with like interests. They felt they needed more knowledge, as they had not had the benefit of a formal higher education.

The idea to have a garden club came from Dr. Edwin Dorset Newton, an Athens physician who had a keen interest in horticulture. Twelve women met in the home of Mrs. Edwin King Lumpkin on a January day in 1891 to form the Ladies' Garden Club of Athens. The primary purpose was to study plants with each member studying a particular variety. These members dedicated themselves to the study of horticulture and the exchange of plants and ideas for the betterment of their community. Members were encouraged "to carry out experiments with different vegetables, flowers, seeds and so forth to find out which varieties were best." The first flower show grew from the exhibitions of their flowers and vegetables.

Reading of our beginning and the goals of our founders sounds very familiar. We should remember their efforts and perhaps even rededicate our efforts to conduct experiments to "find out which varieties were best" and share that with our fellow members.
