Federated Garden Clubs May 1st meeting Led by Spade and Trowel Garden Club

Our final meeting of the year was held on May 01, 2018. The program was a discussion of how our Federated Garden Clubs are addressing the PURPOSE of the garden clubs and how we can include community into the Federated Garden Clubs.

To facilitate the discussion, Federated president, Winifred Holland, prepared a list of questions related to the purpose and the function of each club in the Federation. The Spade and Trowel Garden Club used these questions to guide the discussion on how club meetings and club activities fulfilled the general purpose of the garden club. Seventy five to 90% of those in attendance agreed that the meetings and activities met the clubs purposes. Most agreed that working to keep our city and county clean and beautiful stands at the top of the garden clubs' objective and remain a priority for all members.

Some suggestions on how the clubs can address some concerns were:

1. Young people need to be recruited to insure the long term survival of the

Organization.

- 2. Our general recruiting practices need discussing.
 - a. All minorities
 - b. Men

c. Students

- 3. There was a long discussion of outstanding projects. Some of the projects were:
 - a. Production of edible plants

- b. Flowers for hummingbirds
- c. Tending garden spots for community use
- d. Recycling
- e. Conservation information
- f. Horticulture

Attendees noted that very positive results were had with working at the Historical Center of Rome, Decorations for the Holidays, Hospital therapy program, Department of Family Children Services, The Women's Shelter, and the Family Life Center. Some of the projects mentioned that didn't bring results to garden club members were:

a. Planters on the bridge in Lindale

b. Activities dealing with the Rotary Club

The discussion brought up a need for a publicity chairperson with a committee to publish the activities and meetings that happen on a weekly basis. The publication could include pictures and a written narrative for the newspaper, the radio, facebook, and twitter. Brochures could be composed and placed around the communities in Rome City and Floyd County.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES SCHOOLS TO BE HELD IN ROME

The Laurel District and The Rome Federated Garden Clubs, Inc. will be offering the Environmental Studies School in Rome, Georgia at the ECO Center. Dates for the schools are October 2-3, 2018; January 9-10, 2019; March 20-21, 2019; and May 15-16, 2019. Each two-day school will be \$80.00 and that includes lunch for each day.

The Living Earth is the first course, October 2-3, in the Environmental Studies School offered by the National Garden Clubs, Inc. and taught by local professionals. This two-day course will discuss the four major components of the Earth's life support system and the dynamic impact that ecosystems, environmental pressures, and historic actions create.

In this course, you will learn about environmental challenges and opportunities, identify both beneficial and harmful impacts that humans have on the environment. You will discover methods of creating habitats in local surroundings, both business settings as well as home landscaping. Discover new ways to conserve wasted energy, develop better habits to fuel conservation practices and encourage habitat rehabilitation.

Explore how to connect with groups and organizations to pursue and implement beneficial earth goals and create sustainable environments. Learn how you can create meaningful change while healing the environment and preserving biodiversity.

Professionally guided field trips include the exploration and identification of the habitats surrounding the Rome/Floyd County ECO Center, including the native garden, wetland demonstration area, and native animal exhibits. Lunch will be provided by members of the Rome Federated Garden Clubs.

Environmental Study Schools are open to all garden club members and non-members.

Upon receipt of your enrollment form and check, an acknowledgment, course outline and information on obtaining Living in the Environment textbook will be sent to you.

Anyone wishing to become an Environmental Consultant, accredited by NGC, Inc., must complete all four courses and pass an open book exam on the last day of each course.



Three Rivers planted pollinator pots.


Townview spruced up their garden on Broad at 5th Avenue and erected a banner to announce to Rome that it is National Garden Week.
