

Rome and Floyd County have a very special place that is open for visitors every day– Marshall Forest, which is one of the largest Old Growth Urban Forests in the world and is located just off Horseleg Creek Road in Rome. Marshall Forest needs your continued support. We have many updates planned and hope to begin them when the weather gets cooler and the parking lot dries out. The heavy equipment can't get into the forest without a lot of damage as long as the ground is wet.

This chairman has taken several groups on walks through the forest including Garden Week in Georgia, a garden club meeting and National Garden Week. Many previous visitors tell me how much they enjoy the forest and that they bring husbands, grandchildren, and friends to visit this special place.

We are working to have the Marshall Forest included in the "Old Growth Forest Network". I met with Joan Maloof, founder and director of the Old Growth Forest Network and author of three books on Old Growth forests in late April. She was unable to visit the forest because of the inclement weather and other speaking commitments. Joan plans to return to Rome to see the forest in the spring of 2018.


NEWS FROM SEVEN HILLS GARDEN CLUB WITH REPORT ON FEDERATION PROJECT

What a beautiful day for a luncheon and meeting in the Library Garden. On 11 October Seven Hills met for an activity filled meeting. Yearbooks were distributed and explained, officers were installed by Winnie Holland, Virginia Hunter taught us how to make a succulent wreath, and we discussed our 2017-2019 Federation project. Bags of mulch brought by members were spread in the library gardens and we all enjoyed our picnic basket lunch.

Our Federation project is the restoration of the 2015 Alice Clock Tower Garden. The garden has been without care for two years and when visitors enter the Clock Tower parking lot this is the first thing they see. On 26 October, with the help of eighteen Berry Freshmen students working on their Freshmen community service, we were able to start cleaning the garden. Knock out roses needed to be removed due to disease, weeds were pulled, bushes were trimmed, and flowers were dead headed. Nellie Luthi, Ruth Forrester, Paige Swiger, Linda Sipp, Amanda Kinder, Marla Janes, Jennifer Kearns, and Pam Roberts were present to lead the first step of the restorative process. We will continue to visit the area to remove emerging weeds and spray when necessary. Before winter sets in we will start planting some native perennials with hopes that they will survive the winter. We have encouraged members to share some of the special plants from their gardens. If anyone else has plants to share please contact Seven Hills Garden Club. We hope to make this a sustainable perennial garden that will attract butterflies, birds, and other pollinators and be colorful and welcoming at the same time. When our next workday is announced (depending on weather) Federation members will be notified so others may aid us in this large undertaking.

The Clock Tower Project Committee consists of Mary Frances Wright, chair; Nelly Luthi and Ruth Forrester. Master Gardeners; Linda Sill, publicity and book of evidence; Hollye Smith, neighbor; Jennifer Kearns and Paige Swiger, club Presidents; Barbara Stegall, Historian; Ansley Saville, liaison for city services. These members will work together to design an attractive landscape of sun tolerant species to welcome all visitors year round.

MANY GCG AWARD APPLICATIONS DUE DECEMBER 1

If you are actively involved with Wildflowers you will want to enter an application for the following GCG award. I understand there was not a lot of competition last year!

WILDFLOWER AWARD (Award # 11—Due December 1) Awarded for the most comprehensive activity for the protection, preservation and/or propagation of wildflowers. Entries must include supporting information as applicable: before and after photos, safety considered in all plantings, educational value, aesthetic beauty, unique aspect and/or unusual features, and financial statement. The first-place winner in each category will receive a state certificate. No project may receive an award for 2 consecutive years.

TOWNVIEW VISITS MAJOR RIDGE DEMONSTRATION GARDEN



Townview met at the Grizzard Center for their October meeting with Ginny Word, MG, presenting a program on the Major Ridge Demonstration Garden at Chieftains Museum.

This Garden was created through the vision of the Chieftains Museum Landscape Advisory Board as a way to demonstrate on a smaller scale the wide variety of plants and crops that were grown on Major Ridge's plantation.

Documentation from the time period when Ridge lived on the farm provided direction for the selection of historically accurate plants. The garden brings to life the living history of Major Ridge's large agriculture operation, which included food gardens, vast crop land, acres of orchards and medicinal gardens.

The featured gardens are the raised garden bed, kitchen garden, medicinal bed, native bed, and commercial bed.

The meeting was hosted by Mary Reid, Jo Hernandez and Marti Nasca and featured a fall theme. They served a very tasty Turkey-Apple Waldrop Salad, seasonal muffins, and apple dumplings. This was a fun, informative meeting.
